We won the Board Diversity & Inclusivity award for our commitment to creating a trustee board that is largely representative of the people we serve, with four hearing trustees and six Deaf trustees including our Chair, Jackie Driver.

We have recruited more Deaf staff and all hearing staff are trained to at least level 2 in British Sign Language.

Taking Action

As the pandemic hit, Deaf people turned to SignHealth as their main source of reliable and accessible information.

We responded early to the urgent concerns of our community. Deaf people needed coronavirus information so we provided it. We translated Public Health England guidance and daily government briefings into BSL videos.

Deaf people needed immediate access to healthcare services. The board agreed to launch the BSL Health Access initiative with Interpreter Now providing 24/7 remote interpreting across all healthcare settings.

At the end of the financial year our focus shifted to managing the impact of coronavirus. We wrote several letters, along with other charities, to the Prime Minister and people in government to call their attention to the absence of any information in BSL, including the lack of an in-person interpreter at the daily government press briefings.


All services continued to operate, and we clapped every Thursday evening for our key workers on the frontline.

SignHealth is the only specialist provider of NHS compliant IAPT Psychological Therapies for Deaf people in the UK. We want all Deaf people to have access to therapy in BSL. Currently 60% of CCGs (Clinical Commissioning Groups) will fund direct BSL therapy. The requirement for Individual Funding Requests to local CCGs means Deaf people wait longer for support. As a result only 18% of our clients enter treatment within six weeks against an NHS target of 75%.

Launch of 24/7 Crisis Support

On World Mental Health Day, 10 October 2019, SignHealth joined forces with Shout to provide a free and immediate crisis support service. Since its launch, we've had 235 crisis conversations with people who needed our support.

We are very proud of our partnership with Shout and we have had overwhelmingly positive feedback from the Deaf community.





Deaf women are twice and Deaf children three times more likely to experience domestic abuse as their hearing peers (British Crime Survey, 2010) yet SignHealth runs the UK's only Deaf Domestic Abuse Service working to keep Deaf women and children safe.

We believe that every Deaf adult and child has the right to live life free of fear and abuse.





Funding this vital service

SignHealth is incredibly proud of our person-centred care and support services. We have 30 residential care home places across the country and our services are always full. All our services are rated as Good by the CQC (Care Quality Commission). This year we developed new Service Specifications and a Quality Assurance Framework for our care homes and outreach services. All of our social care services have had a Quality Assurance Review in 2019/20. Improvements identified through these reviews have been incorporated into service specific action plans which are monitored on an ongoing basis.


About our residents:

of residents moved to SignHealth from Specialist Deaf Inpatient Services

of residents receive post-discharge, ongoing clinical or therapeutic input from Community Mental Health teams

of residents are engaged in some form of therapeutic activity or leisure pursuit (e.g. college, voluntary work, therapeutic workshops etc.)



Case Study

Bob (not his real name) joined one of our residential homes in Manchester. Prior to moving in, Bob was living in his own flat with family support. His mental health deteriorated and he would spend long periods of time in bed. This led to an admission to a Deaf mental health unit and a clinical mental health diagnosis.

Today Bob's mental health shapes his life in a more positive way. Everyone in the home communicates in BSL and understands Deaf culture meaning Bob is able to talk and express himself freely. He has a structure to his week and feels empowered to make decisions which affect his life and are central to his care needs.

After much support and reassurance from staff, Bob engaged with SignHealth's psychological therapy team. This has been really positive for his recovery. Bob wants to live independently and to have a job in the future and we will do everything we can to help him achieve that.

Developing our Profile


- Commission new Deaf health research, building on the success of Sick Of It











Financial Overview



We have worked really hard to become a well-run organisation that has a sustainable business model. We achieved a small operational surplus at the end of the last two financial years and we are at our target for Reserves.



THE SIGNHEALTH ST TWO DEAF FOOT FUND

2019 saw the phenomenal fundraising efforts of 'Two Deaf Foot'. Mark Hodgson and Daniel Dorney became the first Deaf men to walk from John O'Groats to Land's End. Their journey raised awareness of mental health issues facing the Deaf community and they kindly donated £30,000 of funds raised to SignHealth. In December 2019



we set up the SignHealth Two Deaf Foot Fund Committee, which includes three Deaf Trustees. This ensures the Deaf Community can understand how their donations are being used. The Committee will review and approve projects and proposals and decide how best to support Deaf mental health.
